CAPOLSA'S BENCHMARKING VISIT TO CSDA

The Coordinator for CAPOLSA Dr Mooya from 22 to 25 April 2025 visited the Centre for Social Development in Africa (CSDA), a research centre at the University of Johannesburg. This was a benchmarking visit to gain insights into the development, operations and management of established research centres. The visit was of great essence as it supported CAPOLSA movement into its next phase of growth. CAPOLSA at that time was applying to be established as a Centre of Excellence in the School of Humanities and Social Sciences at the University of Zambia. Additionally, this visit was meant to foster research collaborations.

The three-day programme involved presentations about the establishment of the CSDA, outlining its vision, mission, and impact as well as the growth and sustainability of the CSDA covering the Centre's evolution, key milestones, support mechanisms and governance structures. Lessons and best practices from other research centres were also presented. All the CSDA's current projects were discussed.

Dr Mooya shared the CAPOLSA experiences tracing its origins and its step by step growth, projections for growth and future plans with colleagues from CSDA. He participated in a tour of the centre and he visited the Orange Farm <u>Basic Package of Support</u> (BPS) site and the University of Johannesburg Soweto Campus.

The behavioural psychology cluster will focus on research that targets the well-being of children, youths and the elderly. It will embody studies on mental health, adolescents and aging.

The CAPOLSA team envision a very busy and highly productive 2026 and sees itself contributing significantly to research and innovation not only in the University but in the region and globally as well. We look forward to engaging with stakeholders that may be Interested in working with us.

CAPOLSA was honoured to attend the launch of the Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM) Centre of Excellence. Established in 2006, the IWRM CoE is hosted by the School of Mines at the University of Zambia. IWRM was officially launched as a centre of excellence at the University of Zambia on 26 September, 2025 The vision of the centre is the advancement and implementation of IWRM interventions in Zambia and the region through education and training, advanced research and consulting services for a sustainable water sector performance. Over 300 postgraduate students have graduated from the centre contributing directly to the nation and regions' pool of skilled water professionals.

A key highlight of the launch of IWRM CoE was the launch of the Prof. Imasiku A. Nyambe Water and Environment (WET) laboratory. The laboratory is set out to contribute to the collection of high quality water and sanitation data as the laboratory boasts of having one of the highly advanced quantitative data analysis capabilities in Sub-Saharan Africa.

It was encouraging to see the strides that IWRM CoE is making in it's contribution towards research and innovation.

As already highlighted, 2025 has been an exciting year at CAPOLSA. Following the award of the status of Centre of Excellence, CAPOLSA is excited to announce to the public and to its partners and key stakeholders that the official launch of CAPOLSA as a Center of Excellence in the University will be held in the first quarter of 2026.

During the launch, members of the public, partners and key stakeholders will have an opportunity to learn about how CAPOLSA as a Center for Excellence is poised to advance literacy research, practice, and public impact through a clear, forward-looking direction. Our core emphasis is on advancing research and scholarship across the full spectrum of literacy development—from early childhood to adult literacy-through rigorous, highquality studies that synthesize findings developmental stages and contexts. We will pursue interdisciplinary inquiries that integrate educational and behavioral sciences, cognitive psychology, linguistics, and information technology to generate insights that inform policy and practice.

To translate knowledge into action, CAPOLSA will develop targeted short courses and postdoctoral programs that deliver professional development, coaching, and mentorship for faculty, educators, and community stakeholders. These offerings will be designed to build capacity, improve instructional outcomes, and empower learners at all levels of society.

Being committed to accessibility and equity, CAPOLSA will produce child-friendly, easy-to-read books for early-grade learners to support literacy acquisition and lifelong engagement with reading. This work will be complemented by strategic partnerships with schools, libraries, community organizations, and industry to expand literacy opportunities and resources.

Looking ahead, CAPOLSA will strengthen local impact while growing collaborations and partnerships internationally, leveraging global networks to share best practices, scale successful interventions, and contribute to a more literate world.

Story Time At CAPOLSA

A bold effort to modernise and revive storytelling as a living, dynamic practice. As education trends shift toward Western paradigms and screen-based learning, Story Time at CAPOLSA aims to safeguard oral traditions for future generations.

CAPOLSA Children's books

With support from The University of Jyvaskyla and the Finnish government, CAPOLSA in 2013 and 2015 produced valuable storybooks in an easy-to-read spelling system in order to ease the acquisition of literacy among early learners in the seven regional languages, namely ciNyanja, iciBemba, chiTonga, siLozi, kiKaonde, Lunda and Luvale. The books contain various stories and poems, enabling Zambian children, no matter which is their first language, to enjoy these fruits of our African storytelling tradition while practicing and perfecting their new skills of retrieving the meaning of a text by reading it.

The books contain a mixture of 4 to 5 texts comprising of stories and poems, cumulatively totaling 49 stories and poems across the 7 regional languages. They are illustrated with full colour pictures. All texts and illustrations were designed by Zambian authors, artists and editors to appeal to children aged 6–10, and to be easy to read and understand as soon as they have taken the first steps of literacy in that language. Each text is followed by a set of three questions for an adult teacher or parent to use for prompting reflection by a young reader on the meaning of the text. Keep your ears to the ground as these books are currently under review and will be published in an easy to access digital form.

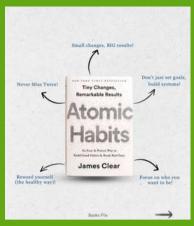

Atomic Habits by James Clear.

James Clear's Atomic Habits that meaninaful teaches change comes from small, consistent rather than big, one-time efforts. The first lesson emphasizes that small habits compound over time-improving by just 1% each day can make you 37 times better after a year, while neglecting actions leads to decline. The second lesson shifts focus from setting goals to building effective systems, since success depends on ambition but the processes that support it you don't rise to the level of your goals, you fall to the level of your systems. Finally, the third lesson highlights the identity-based power habits: lasting transformation begins by deciding the kind of person you want to be and proving it through small, consistent actions. Together, these principles show that change is not a single act but an ongoing process of aligning habits with identity systems that make progress inevitable.

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
